I hope that readers will find this article helpful. To briefly introduce myself, I have been studying abroad in the United States since 8th grade, and I am currently a senior in Mount Saint Charles Academy located in Rhode Island. I have recently submitted all of my college applications so all I do nowadays is waiting. I want to share some of the things my friends and I did to prepare a successful senior year during the meantime.

First of all, I believe the appropriate course load is the single most important thing pertaining to college admissions. Not like Korea, high school students in America get to choose what classes they want to take throughout the academic year as long as they are taking all the credits in order to graduate. Usually, students are required to take 4 years of English and 3 years of math and science and 2 years of history and elective. I still remember the first time my academic counselor handed me the course selection sheet; I was so scared. I didn't know what I wanted to take and spent so much time exploring my options. I didn't wanted to overload the classes but only take easy classes as it would look "bad" to colleges. Thinking back, I took heavy classes compared to my friends and this is what I want to specifically talk about through this article today.

Sure, it is important to "show" how much AP/IB and honors classes you can take. However, it is more important to really ask yourself a question, "is this manageable." I have witnessed many cases where my friends took AP classes just because it would look "good" on the application. This is not as simple as it look if the subject is nothing you find interest in. Some might think that we can't always do what we like and want. In my opinion, it is more important to take classes that you genuinely find interesting, or you are confident that we are going to be able to meet all the expectations. For me, taking AP US history was the biggest mistake. When I was registering for this class, I wasn't fully aware of how much of a reading and essays I had to write. I just took its title "AP" and by the time I realized my mistake, I had no option but to just stand. For students who are anxious about upcoming course selection for next year, please think twice before just signing up for the class. Well-rounded AP courses are important but not if they will be hurting you with bad grades!

Second, be unique with your extracurricular activities. College admissions in America is nothing like Korea's as students have to show their excellence in high academics but in extracurriculars like sports and volunteering as well. I actually took advantage of this as I really enjoyed being involved in different clubs and meeting people with varying interests. I am currently president of three clubs in our school and actively hold meetings with fellow officers to make improvement for the club. However, I wish I would have created my "own" club throughout the high school career. While I actively participated in various club, I have learned there is nothing better than creating and operating your own

club related to your interest. It is not only like an icing on the cake as it would make you standout from other applicants but will actually help you learn important qualities like leadership and moderating skills necessary.

Lastly, make sure to pursue your interest. I know from experience that it is often very hard for highschool students to "know" what they want to study. Of course, we haven't had much experience to really choose what we want to do for the rest of our life. Unsure of what my interest, I tried to get involved in many activities as possible even though they are very different from each other. I was trying to broaden my option for different scenarios which made my life very complicated. If you know what you enjoy studying and doing, try to build your college application based on that. For example, if you are a math person, I would try to join the math team and create some sort of math discussion group and take many math courses offered at school rather than AP world history. I have learned the stronger applicant tend to "stay" with their interest.
